

Advocacy

Parliamentary event in Bern





Together with Medicus Mundi Switzerland (MMS), the Swiss Alliance against Neglected Tropical Diseases (SANTD) and the Parliamentary Intergroup Switzerland-Africa, the Swiss Malaria Group organised a parliamentary event in September 2020. The theme of the event was "Lessons learned from COVID-19: the Swiss contribution to health system strengthening worldwide".

The COVID-19 pandemic shows the world that pathogens do not stop at national borders and highlights how dangerous gaps in medical care can be. In this vein, strong health systems around the world would help addressing current and future pandemics more quickly.

Parliamentarians were invited to jointly analyse and discuss with experts the consequences of COVID-19 for international health cooperation and to reflect the contribution of Switzerland to the strengthening of health systems worldwide.

The World Malaria Day 2020 was marked by major advances in the fight against malaria, with more than 7 million lives saved and over 1 billion cases prevented in the last two decades. At the same time. COVID-19 threatened this progress. The overburdening of health systems caused by COVID-19 posed the risk of a massive increase in malaria infections and deaths. In its press release "Urgent action is critical to save lives", the Swiss Malaria Group therefore called for global action against COVID-19 to protect health systems and ensure they continue to function for the population. At the same time, these measures should not restrict access to life-saving prevention, diagnosis treatment of major diseases such as HIV and malaria, nor slow down the progress gained over the years. The Swiss Malaria Group emphasised that Switzerland's commitment is central.



In a second press release "Starkes Schweizer Engagement wichtiger denn je" the Swiss Malaria Group announced its newly appointed ambassador, the Swiss wrestler and teacher, Marcel Bieri. The news that the strongest teacher in Switzerland is committed in the fight against malaria was taken up very well by the Swiss media and resulted in interviews with 20 Minuten, Blick.ch and Blick TV.





On Social Media, the Swiss Malaria Group launched a small campaign around World Malaria Day with a short video message that every two minutes a child dies of malaria and that therefore the fight against this disease must be continued even during the COVID-19 pandemic. The campaign was accompanied by various background information on malaria as well as links to interviews and press releases.

Campaign launch: World Mosquito Day



On the occasion of the World Mosquito Day on 20 August 2020, the Swiss Malaria Group launched its new campaign with ambassador Marcel Bieri. The professional TV spot shows the strong Swiss wrestler fighting against the deadliest enemy of mankind. With movements that are elegant yet painstaking, the Swiss Malaria Group ambassador tries to catch the malaria mosquito in the sawdust. The mission of this campaign was to raise awareness of the importance of Swiss contribution in the fight against malaria to the wider Swiss public.

The TV spot was aired on SRF 1 and SRF 2 for over a week and on social media the TV spot was accompanied with interviews, background information, making-of videos etc.

Overall the campaign was very well received. An estimated 2'353'072 viewers have seen the TV spot on the television. In addition, 1'239'169 impressions were reached on social media covering Facebook, Instagram, LinkedIn, Twitter and Youtube.

Social media




The main objective of our Social Media channels is to raise awareness and engage our community around the topic of malaria and especially the Swiss contribution in the fight against this treatable and preventable disease. Technical Exchange 2020: Going virtual





"The Swiss contribution to strengthen global health systems – learnings from Swiss expertise on malaria and beyond" was the topic of the 2020 Technical Exchange on October 22.

COVID-19 has shown the important role of strong health systems in fighting pandemics. Providing uninterrupted routine services is crucial during such times, and hence the quality and resilience of health services is even more important during a crisis. Shared knowledge among different sectors and many partners, as well as practical experience are essential to better prepare for future health crises. The goal of this meeting was to pool our Swiss experience in the national and international health sector to identify interventions that contribute to reaching Universal Health Coverage (UHC).


Normally the Technical Exchange is a face-toface meeting where members and partners would come together to exchange and network, but due to the pandemic it was the first time that it was held virtually.



The Swiss Malaria Group closed its financial year on a solid basis. The overall income in 2020 was 161'000.00 CHF (without in-kind contributions). The overall expenses amounted to 186'424.77 CHF. The final account closes with a deficit of -25'424.77 CHF, which is covered by the organisation's capital.
